Programming Increased

New programs like watercolor painting and ballroom dancing were added to returning programs like computer class and Mahjong. The addition of a new Program Coordinator, Anna Lehman, further expanded our program offerings.

Lunch Program Expanded

This program currently averages 20-30 participants per meal. More than half of the meals are served to individuals with limited financial means, and who may not otherwise be able to afford them. These individuals receive meals at a subsidized rate.



Volunteers Helped Make Activities Possible

Sonna Russell taught extremely popular exercise classes, Nancy Braswell guided volunteers to make and deliver over 250 teddy bears to local children and over 250 pillows for cancer comfort bags, and other volunteers like Jill LeTourneau, Charlene Toloso, and T. Shafferman taught everything from Microsoft Windows to candy making.

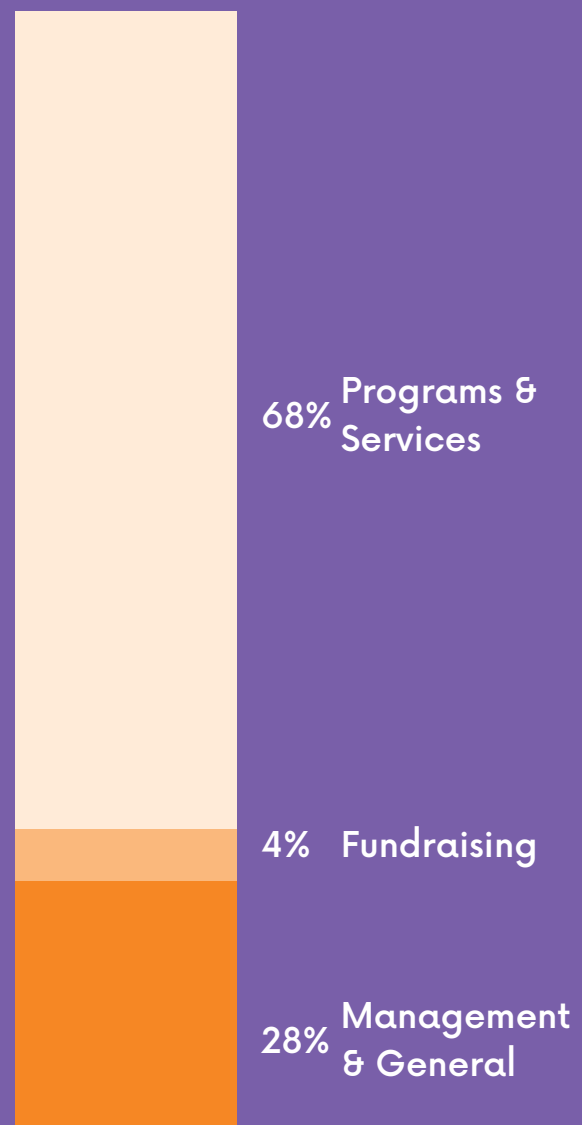
