Programming Increased

New and expanded programming such as yoga and tai chi, technology help sessions, card making and craft workshops, and movie matinees were added to returning programs like floral arranging and Mahjong. To say that our Program Coordinator, Anna Lehman, brings a breath of excitement and love to her role is an understatement.

Lunch Program Expanded

This program served over 2000 lunches in 2024. We expect to increase that again in 2025. More than half of the meals were served to individuals with limited financial means, and who may not otherwise have been able to afford them. These individuals received meals at a subsidized rate.



Volunteers Helped Make Activities Possible

Numerous volunteers helped to make programs, lunches, and daily activities possible in 2024. Sonna Russell taught extremely popular exercise classes, Lorraine Candell led classes on card making, paper crafts, and more, and other volunteers like Charlene Toloso and T Shafferman taught everything from Microsoft Windows to candy making and flower arranging.


